Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The institution adopts a multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary approach to empower students in problem-solving by leveraging diverse perspectives from allied disciplines. This is facilitated through elective papers known as Generic Electives (GE), where students can explore subjects outside their core curriculum. The GE courses provide options such as two papers each in two different subjects or four papers in one subject, allowing for extensive exploration based on individual interests. Additionally, students are required to undertake AECC-I (Environmental Studies) and AECC-II (Language/MIL paper) in the first and second semesters respectively. These courses are taught by faculty specializing in science and language departments respectively. Furthermore, SECC-I and SECC-II courses, like Communicative English and Quantitative Aptitude and Logical Thinking, are instructed by faculty from English, Commerce, and Mathematics departments. This approach not only offers flexibility in course selection but also enriches students' communication skills and logical thinking abilities. By encouraging students to engage with diverse disciplines, the institution fosters a holistic learning environment that prepares them for varied challenges and opportunities
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	in their academic and professional journeys. The University has introduced the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) system across its constituent colleges, starting from the academic year 2023-24 for graduating students. This innovative framework allows students to accumulate credits based on their academic achievements and participation in various educational activities. ABC enhances flexibility by enabling students to earn credits not only through traditional coursework but also through practical projects, internships, and other experiential learning opportunities. Under this system, students can build a personalized academic profile reflecting their diverse skills and accomplishments. It encourages a holistic approach to education by valuing both theoretical knowledge and practical skills, thereby preparing students more comprehensively for their future careers. The implementation of ABC facilitates the University's commitment to providing a dynamic and adaptable educational trends, the University aims to

	empower students with the ability to tailor their learning journey according to their interests and career aspirations. This initiative not only enhances educational quality but also promotes a culture of continuous learning and skill development among its student community.
3. Skill development:	Skill enhancement courses offered by this institution empower students to enhance their capabilities, cultivate practical skills, refine problem-solving techniques, enhance communication abilities, and bolster employability. At our institution, these courses are known as Skill Enhancement Courses (SECC), specifically Communicative English (SECC- I) and Quantitative and Logical Thinking (SECC-II). Communicative English aims to elevate students' language proficiency and communication skills. The primary objective of this course is to fortify their linguistic competence, which confers a distinct advantage in competitive scenarios. Mastery of the English language is pivotal in gaining an edge over peers. Quantitative and Logical Thinking focuses on enhancing students' quantitative aptitude and logical reasoning abilities. The course endeavors to sharpen these critical skills, providing students with a competitive advantage in various examinations and professional settings. These SECC courses are designed not only to impart theoretical knowledge but also to cultivate practical skills essential for success in today's dynamic world. By equipping students with robust communication skills and strong analytical capabilities, the institution prepares them to tackle real-world challenges effectively. This holistic approach ensures that graduates are not only academically proficient but also well-prepared to excel in their careers and contribute meaningfully to society.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	As an affiliated college, we adhere to the model syllabus endorsed by the Department of Higher Education, Govt of Odisha for UG and Sambalpur University for PG courses. Currently, our curriculum does not include provisions for offering online courses in Indian languages.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	To achieve outcome-based learning, every department has developed Program Outcomes (POs), Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs) as benchmarks to track students'

	academic performance and advancement through ongoing assessments. Continuous assessments are enabling faculty members to regularly evaluate students' progress and adjust teaching strategies as needed to support their learning journey effectively. By monitoring POs, PSOs, and COs, departments can ensure that their educational objectives are being met and that students are well-prepared for future academic and professional challenges.

Two faculty members serve as coordinators for these study centers, while several other faculty members from our institution are registered as academic counselors. Additionally, students from our institution have enrolled in add-on courses provided by these universities.
